Society of Men Who Paint for Far West

HOMAS MORAN, Elliott Daingerfield, Edward Potthast, F. Ballard Williams, and DeWitt Parshall were invited by the Santa Fe R. R., with their wives, in Nov., 1910, to visit the Grand Canyon. The pictures resulting from that trip, together with a few by other painters, were exhibited in many museums throughout the country, and the enthusiastic reception given them led to the formation of the present and more comprehensive organization known as the Society of Men Who Paint the West.

Since 1911 this society has sent a circuit of exhibitions annually throughout the U. S.

The increased interest in pictures of Western scenery, as shown by the growing number of mountain pictures in large exhibitions, is probably due to the men in this society and the repeated impressions they have made by exhibiting annually in a body.

All the men in the group are members of the National Academy. The wealth of majestic scenery in Western America affords endlessly varied themes that are essentially American. There is no echo of dead artists, dead schools, and formulas of other peoples, for the reason that our Great West must be interpreted in a personal and new way.

For this reason we believe there will be a great National School of Art based upon our Far West. We do not expect new principles in Art. They are unchangeable; but we do expect the types of composition to be essentially National in character.

These new and different subjects necessitate new forms of composition. Eventually they may create new technical methods. Already there are many men in this country whose art is distinctly personal, whose work suggests little of imitation, and on whom the influence of Old World Schools has left scant traces, and there are many artists now in the making, who, like Winslow Homer, see nature with their own and not dead men's eyes. The Society of Men Who Paint the Far West stands primarily for the furthering of this National spirit in Art.
